

nnandale will once again usher in the new year with its New Year's Eve Ball Drop, which is also known as "New Year's at 9."

The unique winter tradition in Annandale focuses on the "New Year's at 9" Times Square style, lighted-crystal ball drop from the top of the Clock Tower at the Clock Tower Park, not at midnight but at 9 p.m. This year's event will be on Sunday, Dec. 31.

Since it started in 2014, the New Year's Eve ball drop event has been a popular attraction. With the exception of the pandemic and a year when the temperatures were just too cold - even for Minnesotans – the ball drop has been a family tradition.

It became even more popular since the time was changed to provide an opportunity for families

to attend, thus allowing families with children to enjoy the tradition without having to stay up until midnight.

"Watching the excitement of the children who attend brings a special kind of community focus to the event," Vicki Morgan said, who coordinated the ball drop for many years and still helps out.

Father Time and Baby New Year will appear again this year, offering fun photo opportunities to celebrate with noisemakers, hats, and other celebratory effects.

The tower will be specially lit, and music from Minnesota Main Street Radio will add to the festivities, which occur from about 8:45 to 9:15 p.m. on Sunday, Dec. 31.

The entire community is invited to the ball drop, which is sponsored by the Annandale Chamber of Commerce. Come out and welcome in the new year a few hours early.

ind fun for every age at the newly imagined Christmas in Maple Lake.

Downtown business owners took the 18-year-old holiday tradition and put a new spin on it for Christmas 2023. What used to be a morning event that catered to families with young children, has expanded into two events - one for kids in the morning, and one for grown-ups in the afternoon, said Brandan Hoon, owner of the Spooky Brew Coffee Co. and one of the event organizers.

Parents are invited to bring the kids to downtown Maple Lake from 10 a.m. until noon, Saturday, Dec. 2 where they will get to meet Santa Claus and his reindeer, roast s'mores over an open fire and enjoy an assortment of activities indoors at the downtown businesses.

At 3 p.m. the tone of the event will change. Santa Claus will still be around, but the kids' activities will be replaced by an outdoor winter market, live music, and drinks. Parents are invited to leave the kiddos home with a babysitter for this portion of the celebration.

This annual event has been the highlight of the community's holiday festivities for nearly two decades. Hosted by the Maple Lake Chamber of Commerce, it takes place outdoors along Division Street and Birch Avenue.

The focal point of the morning celebration is Santa Claus who arrives by fire truck to the delight of the waiting children. This year he'll disembark at Sunfish Dental's new clinic in the old McHugh building on Birch Ave. After greeting the congregated children, he'll head inside where families can pose for photos with him in the comfort of the heated dental office.

Just down the street in the empty lot, Bluestem Reindeer Ranch of Maple Lake will have a few special guests - Santa's

reindeer! This is not a petting zoo, but children will be able to see up close the muscle behind Santa's Christmas Eve deliveries.

From there, check out the Vintage Snowmobile Show then warm up at one of the grated fire pits where children will find all the makings for a s'more. If you're still cold, grab a hot chocolate or coffee from Spooky Brew or shuffle into a participating downtown business where the kids will be further entertained with activities such as ornament making and coloring. Watch for signs showing which businesses are participating, Hoon

In years past, Miss Maple Lake and her princesses have been on hand making their special magic reindeer food for children to sprinkle around their yards on Christmas Eve. They always like help and will have stations set up for kids to participate.

Throughout the morning, children will get a thrill from seeing some of their favorite holiday characters mingling with the crowd. In past years Olaf from Disney's "Frozen," has paid Maple Lake a visit along with elves, Mrs. Claus,


and a walking Christmas Tree.

The evening portion of the celebration takes place from 3 to 6 p.m. Find unique Christmas gifts at the winter market, which Hoon said will be something like a mini-Makers and Growers Market from the summer. A hand full of vendors will be set up along Birch Avenue. There will also be a heated tent where those 21 and older can enjoy an alcoholic beverage. Katie King from Kings 46 Wine Bar will be mixing up Sake Cider and the signature German drink, Warm Gluhwein. This drink is served hot to warm you from the inside out.

Nearby, Doug Lindenfelser of The Butchery of Maple Lake will be cooking up warm sandwiches and through it all, there will be live music.

Christmas in Maple Lake has been a tradition looked forward to by the children in this community for almost 20 years. For many years it was held inside at the elementary school. Two years ago, organizers moved it to Birch Avenue to show off the city's unique downtown. Local business owners are helping to put this year's event together.

hough retailers may begin playing holiday tunes shortly after Halloween, for many people, no date on the calendar marks the beginning of the holiday season better than the day they pick up their Christmas tree.

For many, this tradition means an expedition to a tree lot or a Christmas tree farm to find the perfect Fir or Spruce.

The Minnesota Grown Directory offers this list of local tree farms. There are cut your own and pre-cut options, plus extras like visits with Santa, live reindeer, gift shops and more.

#### **Crow River Nursery**

Crow River Nursery is located on the Crow River five miles north of Howard Lake on County Road 6. This grower of fir and pine trees has many different varieties of trees available including Balsam, Korean, Siberian and Fraser Fir; Scotch, Norway, and White Pine; Blue, Meyer, Serbian and Norway Spruce. Hours are Friday, Saturday, and Sunday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Nov. 17-Dec 17 and Wednesday and Thursday from 12 to 5 p.m. Nov. 29-Dec 14. Closed Thanksgiving.

#### Peterson Tree Farm

Peterson Tree Farm is a 225-acre family farm in a beautiful country setting in Clear Lake. Cut-your-own Fraser, Balsam, Canaan, Korean and Siberian Fir, Spruce, Scotch, Norway, and White Pine. Many tall trees are



he Canadian Pacific
Holiday Train returns to
Central Minnesota this
year with stops in Buffalo and
Annandale on Wednesday, Dec.
13th.

The 1,000-foot train with hundreds of thousands of LED lights is scheduled to arrive at 5:45 at the 5th Street NE railway crossing in Buffalo. At 7:15 p.m. it will arrive at Downtown Park in Annandale near the Harris Street West railway crossing. Sometime between 6:30 and 7:15 p.m. it will pass through Maple Lake. For those wanting to catch a glimpse of the bedazzling locomotive, First Street on the south end of the Maple Lake Community Park is a good place to do it.

This is the CP Holiday Train's 25th year of touring. Throughout the holiday season it makes stops at large and small communities across the United States and Canada supporting the local food shelves by raising money, food, and awareness for food insecurity.

While it's a sight all on its own as it trundles across the country with its 14 brightly lit rail cars, each decorated with illuminated holiday designs, it's the show that will really fill your cup with holiday spirit. At 6 p.m. in Buffalo and 7:30 p.m. in Annandale, the train will open its side doors to a musical stage fit for a star – or two stars in this case.

Dallas Smith, a three-time Canadian Country Music Awards winner for Entertainer of the Year, is teaming up with MacKenzie Porter, a 15-time CCMA nominee, to deliver a toe-tapping Holiday concert that is sure to warm the heart even if it's a cold night outdoors. But the real heart of the Holiday Train isn't the lights or the music. Its true purpose is to

fight hunger.

Between the CP Holiday Train's first stop in Annandale in 2004 and its last before Covid in 2019, it helped raise a total of \$272,560 and 24,557 pounds of food for the Annandale Food Shelf. That final year before Covid attracted an estimated 2,000 people to Annandale and generated \$36,000 in donations and 536 pounds of food. In 2020, the Annandale food shelf still managed to raise \$21,900 despite the pandemic and no CP train. In 2021, CP hosted a virtual tour, and the local food shelf was able to raise \$31,000. That amount included a check of \$4,500 from Canadian Pacific. Last year was the first year the Holiday Train was back, live and in person.

The donations go a long way in helping the local food bank provide groceries to families in need in its three communities - Annandale, Maple Lake, and South Haven. Donations over the years have also helped the local food shelf buy a used van

and build a new building.

Since the Holiday Train program launched in 1999, it has raised more than \$21 million and collected 5 million pounds of food for community food banks across North America.


Holiday Train shows are free to attend, Canadian Pacific only asks attendees bring a cash or non-perishable food donation if they are able.

Norway spruce. Balsams are known for having the most fragrant smell, but Frasers tend to keep their needles the longest. For those who prefer a Douglas fir, keep in mind that they sometimes drop their needles prematurely due to foliar diseases like needle-cast fungus.

#### **Space for ornaments**

In addition to aroma and needle longevity, look for trees that have a desirable shape and allow for adequate space between branches. Trees groomed to be lush and full will look beautiful unadorned, but once ornaments are added, full branches may cause those ornaments to hang low or even fall off. Trees with sparse branches allow for ornaments to hang straight.



#### Measure your space

Trees in the field or in a lot may look much smaller than they do when brought into the living room. Don't make the mistake of selecting a tree that is too large for your home. Measure the room from floor to ceiling and subtract the height of the tree stand and tree topper. It's equally important to measure the width of the area where the tree will stand and allow for ample space for foot traffic around the tree.



#### Perform a needle check

Every tree will drop some needles, and most evergreens hold their foliage. Modest needle loss is not an indicator of a poor tree. However, if 50 percent of the needles are lost when you swipe your hand down three to five different branches around the tree, the tree likely is not a good choice. In addition, avoid a tree that has glaring defects in the trunk as it can impede water flow through the tree.

#### **Heavier** is better

A heavy pre-cut tree means it is full of water and has been cut more recently. A healthy, fresh tree is going to require an effort to lift. Older, dried out trees will not be heavy.

Upon arriving home, make a fresh cut off the tree trunk and get it in water as soon as possible - even if that's a bucket until a tree stand can be set up.

#### Did you know . . .

Historians believe a man named W.V. McGallard established the first commercial Christmas tree farm when he planted 25,000 Norway spruce seedlings at his Mercer County, New Jersey farm in 1901. By 1908, customers could visit the farm and choose trees for \$1 each. McGallard helped create a new industry that now accounts for 350 million trees being grown and sold in the United States every year.



he renowned writer Ernest Hemingway is credited with saying, "My only regret in life is that I didn't drink more wine." Perhaps if the author had a better understanding of pairing wine with food, he would have enjoyed his wine a bit more often?

Unless you're spending time with a master sommelier or a seasoned oenophile, you're unlikely to be given a hard time if your wine and food pairings are not perfect. Although there is no need to always pair a bottle with food like an expert - and it's certainly alright to break the rules if you're particularly passionate about a specific type of wine - a general knowledge

of classic food-and-wine parings can help anyone expand their knowledge and please their palate. And yes, it goes beyond white is for fish and red is for beef.

As the holidays approach, many more people will be looking for that perfect bottle of wine to serve their guests. Fortunately, there are several liquor stores in the area with knowledgeable staff who can offer advice in that department including O'Brothers Wine & Spirits and French Lake Liquor in Annandale, Maple Lake Wine and Spirits in Maple Lake and Das sel Liquors off Highway 12 in Dassel. Some stores will even allow you to sample different varieties if you just





can't make up your mind. Maple Lake Wine and Spirits offers that service and more. The municipal liquor store hosts a wine club for those who are passionate about wine year- round. For the rest of us, every December, they host a Holiday Wine and Spirits Tasting at the Maple Lake American Legion. This year's event will take place on Wednesday, Dec. 6 and will feature close to a dozen vendors who will be giving away samples of a variety of liquors including wine, spirits, and beers. To keep things fun, there will also be appetizers and prizes given away. The cost is \$20 for the public, and \$10 for wine club members.

If you are in a hurry, this crash course on basic wine pairing courtesy of the experts at Food & Wine, Tasting Table and Wine Folly can help anyone find the right combination for their dinner table this holiday season.

#### **Basic methodologies**

As you grow more familiar with wine, you'll learn why these tried-and-true suggestions often work

- Red wines pair best with bold flavored meats (red meat).
- White wines pair best with light-intensity meats (fish and chicken).



There are liquor stores in the area with knowledgeable staff who can help you pick out the best wine for your holiday party. Some of the stores even offer samples. If you still haven't found that perfect wine for your Christmas table, think about attending the Holiday Wine and Spirits Tasting at the Maple Lake American Legion.

- The wine should have the same flavor intensity of the food.
- · Wine should be sweeter than food.
- · Wine should be more acidic than food.
- It is better to match the wine with the sauce than with the meat.
- Think about whether you want contrasting or congruent pairings. Red wines often create congruent pairings while white, sparkling and Rosé will create contrasting pairings.

#### Congruent versus contrasting

Congruent pairings, according to Wine Folly, create balance in the mouth by amplifying shared flavor compounds. For example, earth wines paired with earthy mushrooms. Contrasting pairings create balance through contrasting flavors. Therefore, a salad with acidity and bitterness may be complemented with a wine that is sweeter and not so acidic, or so may be the case with a fatty, salty food like foie gras.

#### **Common pairings to try**

- Mushrooms, lentils and even salmon go great with reds like Pinot Noir or Dolcetto. These wines are light-bodied but also full of savory appeal.
- Champagne and oysters work because Champagne has a touch of fruity sweetness. This helps it cut through salty foods like oysters or even chips.
- Cabernet, and Bordeaux are ideal with steaks and lamb dishes. The tannins in cabernet will cut through the protein and fat in these red meats, while the fat balances out the rich tannins.
- You'll need a white wine that pops like Sauvignon Blanc, to go with tangy foods, such as grapefruit or scallops. White wine works with various vinaigrettes or tangy cheeses.
- Chianti is a prized Italian wine made from Sangiovese grapes. High acidity and noticeable tannins will help chianti pair well with high acid foods like those featuring tomato sauces, such as a rich pasta dish.

It may take some time to gain experience pairing wine and foods. However, with a little practice, you too can perfect your wine pairing skill.



# Have an Old-Fashion Christmas

your heart is yearning for an old-fashioned Christmas this holiday season, look no further than Minnesota Pioneer Park. The open-air museum located just off highway 55 in Annandale knows how to celebrate the holidays in the same simple style families did 150 years ago.

On Saturday, Dec. 2 from 11 a.m. until 2 p.m. Pioneer Park volunteers invite you to take a trip back in time during the park's Village Christmas celebration and experience the nostalgic simplicity of a bygone era.

Start your tour at the 1886 train depot then make your way up the path to the original Crow River Finnish Apostolic Church and see what Christmas mass was like in the early 1900s.

Breath in the campfire aroma at the 1884 Sorenson Cabin where volunteers Bob Ahonen and his wife prepare biscuits and heat apple cider using the working cast-iron cookstove that needs to be fed wood constantly in order to keep heating evenly.

Visit the one-room school and the 1902 house then make your way down to the village to walk the wooden boardwalk and explore turn-of-the-century shops like the general store and the millinery. Finally, have your

picture taken with Santa Claus.

It's hard to imagine what life was like during pioneer days and how the holidays were celebrated, but according to Legends of America, Christmas traditions in the mid-1800 weren't that different from what we celebrate today.

One of the oldest traditions, but still very much alive in our own homes, is the Christmas Tree. The Germans are credited with the creation of this custom when they became the first to bring evergreen trees inside their homes to be decorated. Evergreen boughs were long appreciated as a reminder of springtime in the dark of winter, but the practice of decorating a "Christmas tree" is said to have really taken off when Germany's Prince Albert and his new wife, Queen Victoria of England were pictured in front of one in 1848.

Pioneer families upheld this tradition as best they could, but they often ran into difficulties. If they lived on the prairie, for instance, pine trees would have been scarce, Ahonen said. As an alternative, they may have brought inside a single branch from whatever tree they could find and decorated its smaller boughs with popcorn strings, bits of ribbon and yarn or cookie dough ornaments painted in festive colors.

Even if there were plenty of pine trees in the area, pioneer homes were often too small to fit a full-size tree. Families solved that problem by chopping off just the top of the tree and using that as their holiday centerpiece. There was also a fear of fire, which deterred some pioneer families from taking part in the Christmas Tree tradition all together, Ahonen said.









Gift giving was alive and well during the pioneer days, as was Santa Claus who had made his way into popular American culture by the end of the 18th century. According to History.com, the name Santa Claus evolved from St. Nickolas's Dutch nickname, Sinter Klaas, a shortened form of Sint Nikolaas (Dutch for Saint Nicholas). In 1804, John Pintard, a member of the New York Historical Society, distributed woodcuts of St. Nicholas at the society's annual meeting. The engraving depicts the nowfamiliar image of Santa by a fireplace from which stockings hang filled with toys and fruit.

Of course, gift giving in the 19th century was a lot more subdued than it is in today's materialistic culture. Christmas gifts were mostly handmade, Ahonen said and during the holiday season talents were traded and bartered.

Say a family had a grandparent or neighbor who was a talented woodworker, they might have him carve a toy for their son or daughter and they would trade something of equal value in return, maybe a service of some kind, Ahonen said.

Homemade gifts might have included corn husk dolls, sachets, pillows, knitted

stories, and reading from the Bible. On Christmas Day, most would attend church.

Chris Lantto is the guide at Pioneer Park's Finnish church, and he likes to tell quests what it was like attending that very church when he was a child. He will talk about how the men sat on one side of the aisle and the ladies on the other. while mothers sat in the back with their children to be near the stove, Ahonen

After church families returned home for the Christmas feast. This was the one part about the holidays that was done

up well by almost every pioneer family, Ahonen said.

According to Legends of American, a traditional pioneer Christmas meal consisted of preserved fruits and vegetables, fresh game if possible, and for those that could afford it, a beef or ham. Many women began to bake for the holiday weeks ahead of time.

Wilder wrote in her books of her family's Christmas preparations, describing how her "ma" was busy all day long, "cooking good things for Christmas. She baked salt-rising bread and 'Injun bread, Swedish crackers, and a huge pan of baked beans, with salt pork and molasses. She baked vinegar pies and dried-apple pies and filled a big jar with cookies, and she let Laura and Mary lick the cake spoon."

A few of Pioneer Park's historic buildings will be open, Dec.2, for visitors to view and volunteers will be available to answer questions, Ahonen said. There will be kids' activities in the Big Woods building which is also where Santa will be waiting for pictures. Enjoy wagon rides around the park, live Christmas music, a bake sale, craft sale, food and beverages and more.


